Candle Lighting

- P: Jesus Christ, born the Prince of Peace, calls our community to justice and leads us in the way of peace.
- L: We call one another to honesty and humility and respond to each other with abundant grace and forgiveness.
- P: Our community values relationships. We live in harmony with one another even when we disagree, and strive to glorify God in everything we do.
- L: Our community longs for unity. We work together with other churches and organizations, and live out God's reconciling love for all the world to see.
- **P: Together, we are a sign of God's peace in the world.**The candle of peace is lit.

Prayer of Approach

P: God of all people and all nations, you break through the cynicism of our world and lead us like a gentle shepherd. Open our eyes to see the signs of your coming kingdom and inspire us to participate in all you are doing in Jesus' name. Amen.

Prayer of Confession

- P: Merciful God, our baptism proclaims the washing away of our sin and the start of our new life in Christ. But we confess that we still live in sin. We sin against you and one another, in what we do and in what we fail to do. We excuse ourselves, and take comfort in familiar habits and traditions. Forgive us when we mistake such comfort for the peace you offer us in Christ Jesus. Prepare our hearts to embrace new ways of following him.
- L: Zechariah, father of John the Baptist, proclaimed this hope: "By the tender mercy of our God, the dawn from

on high will break upon us, giving light to those in darkness, guiding our feet in the way of peace." Receive God's tender mercy today. Trust that God's peace will prevail for all those who seek forgiveness in Jesus' name.

In the spring of 2020 our offsite location of the Cambridge Food Bank (CFB) was put on hold. This was a decision by the CFB. By the end of the summer (2020), it became obvious that people in our community really needed help with food security. In the fall of 2020 members of the congregation and our Session wrote letters to the CFB asking to bring it back to St. Andrew's. A long story short ... the CFB would love to come back to Hespeler, but they were short staffed and short of volunteers. The staff, Session and volunteers of St. Andrew's stepped up and have been running this offsite location since last fall.

In March 2021 we were approached by the CFB to be a pilot location for the new Waterloo Region Food Bank Mobile Food Truck. The Mobile Food Truck came packed with dry goods hampers, fresh food hampers and frozen food for our community members. We had the use of this Mobile Food Truck until the end of June 2021.

I depend on this location for food bank. I wouldn't have enough food to get me through the week without this.

Once July came around, we pivoted again. The CFB now delivers dry goods, fresh foods (including eggs and milk) and frozen foods to St. Andrew's every week. We pack the dry hampers and

distribute the food. We record visits into

the provincial database. Every week we order, from the CFB, what is needed for the following week. We have been serving outside, on the first Thursday of December we brought the CFB back inside. Flexibility is the key right now as we endeavour to keep everyone safe; staff, volunteers and community members.

The food bank for me is very important, gives my family meals, that we can count on. Helps me a lot, especially now that all is so expensive. Eggs, milks fruits and vegetables. Everything that we get we are very grateful. We always pray at Byron thank God for all we get.


Every Thursday there are people lined up to get help with their food. In November we served 45 families, or approximately 110 people. Approximately 85 volunteers hours were used in November to serve the Hespeler Community. While in line there are lots of conversations between other community members and our volunteers. We are creating a safe place for our community. We have had the pleasure of meeting new immigrants (who have only moved to Canada in the last 2 or 3 months). The first cold snap was a surprise! We have had the privilege of hearing some life stories, where people immigrated from and why. We are learning about traditions (particularly Christmas traditions right now) from different parts of the world. We are even learning how to cook some traditional foods. We might even learn a new language.

Supporting Vulnerable Children

Antony Misoya, a 15-year-old orphan from Mitumbira village in Malawi, is HIV positive. He attends a program managed by the Mulanje Mission Hospital where he receives care and support with his antiretroviral medication regimen. Staff began to notice Antony's visits to the program had become less frequent. When asked, Antony told them, "I go around



looking for work to support my two brothers and sister; sometimes I miss my treatment because I am working." Program staff visited Antony and his guardian and discovered that it had become difficult for her to provide for all four children, so the team provided them with support that made it possible for Antony to attend the clinic regularly and focus on his studies. This project that provides care and support to orphans and vulnerable children in Malawi is supported by Presbyterian World Service & Development.
