Make it plain on tablets

On Anniversary Sunday (October 30) this year, I preached a sermon on a passage from the Prophet Habakkuk. (If you ever want to read or watch a sermon you might have missed, just look on the web site under "Minister's Blog.") Don't lose hope. God is still in charge of

As I read the passage I was particularly struck by one verse where the prophet speaks for God and says, "Write the vision; make it plain on tablets, so that a runner may read it. For there is still a vision for the appointed time." (Habakkuk 2:2-3) For me, that verse seemed to present a particular challenge to the church in society today.

Love (y)our neighbour(s) the same way Jesus loves us. Jesus loves you!

We seem to struggle, sometimes, with the whole question of whether or not the gospel message is relevant in our modern world. To me, that verse suggests that, if no one is particularly paying attention to what we have to say, the problem may not be with the message, but simply with the fact that we are not proclaiming that message boldly enough.

Habakkuk seemed to be saying that, if only we could make the message clear enough, so clear that even somebody running by could read it, then it would be bound to make a difference.

I noted the story of a German pastor who, in the midst of the worst antisemitism of the Second World War, at a time when not only were there millions of Jews being sent to extermination camps, but also every trace of Jewish heritage A message of hope and vigilance:

(The Byrds) - to everything (turn, turn, turn) There is a season (turn, turn, turn) And a time to every purpose under heaven.

Meaning: God is at work in everything. Everything on Earth serves God's purpose. We may just not understand it yet.

the world. He will have the last word!

On my tablet: Love one another!

within Christianity itself was being eradicated from the German Church, stated that the only gospel that mattered in his day was the Gospel that stated, "Jesus was a Jew."

It seemed to me that, in a world that seems to be increasingly marked by division, hatred and intolerance, what we needed

The answer to yesterday's question, after long thought is simply LOVE THY NEIGHBOUR. That is what my bold banner would say

to do was find a message that was so clear and succinct that people could not help but notice.

But I didn't want to say what that message would be myself. Instead, I decided to pass that challenge on to the congregation as a whole. I asked the people in the

congregation to tell me what they would write on the tablet so large that even a runner could read it. What is the radical statement of what it means to be a Christian in the troubled world where we find ourselves today? How would you sum it up in just a few words?

I've got to say that I was really impressed with the answers that I got. Many of you did rise to that challenge and I wanted to take the opportunity of this newsletter to share the answers that I received. You will find them on this page.

Inclusive Non-judgemental Compassionate

A Very Special Thank You to the Presbytery of Waterloo-Wellington



"Bulletins" mailbox to find the latest editions.








Also in the Communications Centre, grab a "Gifts of Change" catalogue. What sort of

Watch your mailboxes for a letter from our Stewardship committee highlighting what funds raised will be allocated to and for ways you can donate.



New this year: A Family Playlist

A family playlist is simply a list of links to use for activities, readings, videos and stories. On the playlist you can also find a brief explanation of the focus scripture for the week and a prayer. Everyone is encouraged to make use of this resource at home. A new playlist is posted on the website weekly.

Faith @ Home: we will continue to make use of our Faith @ Home boxes this year. The first delivery will happen just before the beginning of Advent. Included this time will be a "Faithful Families @ Home" package. This year we will be concentrating on the importance of learning to pray. This package will include Prayer Pockets for each youth and child. The pockets were each lovingly made by members of St. Andrew's for our children and young people. There will also be ideas about creating a sacred space at home and ideas for gathering together to pray and talk each week of Advent. Psst: it involves dessert!!

Intergenerational Worship continues at St. Andrew's. While we are in a time of change and finding our new normal we are developing intergenerational worship services so that the entire family is included in worship.

Instead of a Children's Message we have moved to Family Time. On occasion when we don't have children worshipping with us in person there is a lesson for the entire St. Andrew's family.

While some parents may worry about how much noise their children might make or how much they might move around, so far the children who have joined us have enjoyed being with everyone and have fun seeing what is in their pew package each week.

During Family Time, there are instructions for the children; e.g.: listen to the message and pick out the "really different name" of the person Scott is telling us about; make a picture, using the supplies in the pew package of the story they heard this morning during the bible reading and Family Time. There is always a snack in the Pew Package, too.

Any noises are welcome by everyone in the sanctuary. We have been missing our children and young people. If children have a need to move, they are always welcome to come to the back where Joni sits and talk about what they made or just to move and stretch out.

The main point is that our children and youth are very much welcome to join us, just the way they are! Please help our families out as they start bringing their children back, start a conversation with them, ask them what they did this week, ask them what the best part of their week was or if they have anything special planned for the week ahead. You might be surprised at how willingly the children respond to you!
