


DAILY PRAYERS

Mission Moment – Sunday, November 27th

Raamia fled to Pakistan with her daughter after divorcing her abusive husband in Afghanistan. As a single mother, Raamia made and sold handicrafts to support herself and her daughter, Zainab.

On their way to the city of Lahore, she and her daughter got into accident. Her daughter was unharmed, but Raaima was severely injured, resulting in her arm having to be amputated. After the accident, she could not continue working on her handicrafts. Raamia and her daughter were selected to receive cash support from a project by Community World Service Asia, a Presbyterian World Service & Development partner. "I was able to buy some

food supplies with the money I received," she said. This project is helping

refugee families who have fled Afghanistan since the Taliban takeover.
